## Making the Pipes "Speak"



Hello and I'm wishing each of you a very Happy Easter,

As we enter March of this year, it is interesting and fitting to note that Easter and our annual Gospel Music Program will occur in the same month. Very much looking forward to you joining us with our program which will feature both chapter members and guests presenting an enjoyable evening of vocal, piano, theatre pipe organ, and possibly other instruments with renditions of Gospel music.

As a chapter of the American Theatre Organ Society, our mission is to both preserve and promote the theatre organ and its music. With that in mind, I would like to share with you information about the Oklahoma History Center's wonderful WKY 4/14 Kilgen Theatre Pipe Organ Opus 5281 and its related programs.

The organ was built and installed in 1936 by the Kilgen Organ Company of St. Louis for Oklahoma City's Radio Station WKY new studios where it was used for "live aired" programs for about ten years. In 1951, when the radio station moved to a new location, the organ was sold to the City and was installed in the City's Municipal Auditorium where it was used for a variety of programs and concerts.

In 1998, the former Municipal Auditorium (now known as the Civic Center Music Hall) was to be remodeled but the plans did not include the Kilgen. The organ was removed and stored for some future venue.

About the same time, the Oklahoma Historical Society was planning to build the Oklahoma History Center on the State Capitol Complex. The Center was planned to have a large multi-stored atrium along with many large museum exhibit areas for historical displays. OHS Duputy Executive Dr. Bob Blackburn agreed that the Kilgen organ should be part of the Center's exhibits. Funding from many sources evolved for the painstaking total restoration and installation of the organ within the Center's atrium by students and staff of the former American Organ Institute of OU.

Today this magnificent organ can be heard at select times (basically four times a year). Tedde Gibson, former ATOS president and noted theatre and classical organist provided a masterful accompaniment for the classic drama silent film "Captain January" starring Baby Peggy this past month of February.

The next program will be: April 15 7-8:30pm featuring organist Rosemary Bailey. She is well known not only by her colleagues with the ATOS, but by audiences from around the world. Rosemary possesses "perfect pitch" which allows her to improvise with symphonic orchestras and with various jazz ensembles. Her approach has been labeled unique by critics and purveyors of theatre organ artistry and has been acclaimed by many reviews as outstanding, brilliant, and works of genius.
